

Church Disaffiliations/Closures Since 2019*



^{*}Total UMC Churches in 2019 = 30,541





Jurisdiction	Expenditures	Churches
North Central	17.66%	22.88%
Northeastern	12.64%	18.01%
South Central	29.55%	33.87%
Western	2.24%	12.47%
Southeastern	24.38%	32.08%
Total	21.46%	26.50%


Disaffiliated churches are similar in size (membership) to UMC churches

Higher proportion of very large churches (4,000+ members) are disaffiliating

Among disaffiliating churches, 50% or fewer appear to be joining the Global Methodist Church

Large disaffiliating churches are more likely to become independent Methodist congregations

UMC Withdrawal—U.S. Clergy Benefits Impacts

Type of	Active Clergy		Retired
Benefit	Elders, Deacons (¶360)	Provisional Members, Licensed Local Pastors	Clergy
Retirement benefits	Convert income for life to equivalent lump sum account balance	No conversion of life annuity; payments can begin at age 62	No impact; income for life continues
Death benefit (life insurance)	Benefit ends 30 days after withdrawal effective date	Benefit ends 30 days after withdrawal effective date	No impact; death benefit continues

Impacts on any conference-determined benefits vary by conference

Jurisdictional Conferences—November 2022

- 13 bishops elected for19 open episcopal areas
- Resolutions approved in all five jurisdictions
 - Regionalization support (Christmas Covenant or U.S. Regional Conference)
 - Justice and Empowerment for LGBTQIA+ People
 - Leading with Integrity


- Subject to the "post-Christian" trend of Americans leaving church generally
- Continuing impacts of the pandemic
 - In person attendance not fully restored;
 some attending online or not at all
 - High stress and fatigue among pastors, now compounded by disaffiliations
- Some anxiety about General Conference






20-Year Trend in U.S. Church Membership

More than half of clergy reported the pandemic negatively affected their social and emotional well-being






Impact of Disaffiliation

- 37% of clergy reported dealing with conflict or difficulty with disaffiliation in their ministry
- Disaffiliation conflict within The United Methodist Church impacts all dimensions of well-being
- Clergy who reported **some or a lot** of disaffiliation conflict or difficulty had higher risk of arthritis*, functional difficulty from depressive symptoms, social connection, occupational stressors and financial stress than clergy who reported **little or no** conflict

^{*} Arthritis is associated with inflammation, which can increase as stress levels increase

Positive Indications for the UMC in U.S.

- Readiness to move from conflict to mission and ministry
- New faith communities prompted by disaffiliations
- Heightened unity and sense of purpose
